PROPOSED ACTION: Resolution: Approve and Authorize the Executive Director to: (1) Apply for and, if Awarded, Accept and Execute a Grant Agreement with the United StatesU.S. Environmental Protection Agency for the Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles Grant Program for a Grant Amount Not to Exceed of \$10,499,274 with \$5,158,500 of Matching Funds, and (2) Execute All Ancillary Agreements such as Individual Sub-Grant Agreements with Project Partners to Enable Grant Funding; and Finding that the Proposed Action is Exempt Under the California Environmental Quality Act. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

In November 2024, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) awarded the Port of Oakland (Port) a Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles Grant (Grant) in the amount of \$10,499,274, which requires \$4,961,250 of matching funds. Project partner United Parcel Service (UPS) will be providing the mandatory match as well as some voluntary cost share, totaling \$5,158,000. The Grant will support 1) the replacement of 60 Class 6 UPS delivery trucks with zero-emission (ZE) battery electric vehicles and install chargers at three San Francisco Bay Area logistics centers (Including 40 in East Oakland and the Oakland Airport Business Park), 2) community participation in the development and implementation of a community engagement plan; 3) workforce training on zero-emissions equipment, and (4) grant administration. Action will be requested regarding applying for, accepting and executing a grant agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for the Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles Grant Program and executing sub-grant agreements with project partners.

BACKGROUND & ANALYSIS

On July 25, 2024, the Port applied for an EPA Grant, titled *Empowering Delivery for Tomorrow: Port of Oakland and UPS Transition to Battery Electric Trucks Serving Bay*

Area Disadvantaged Communities (Project), in partnership with UPS, a major tenant of the Port and one of the largest fleet operators in Oakland and the greater San Francisco Bay area. The requested funding will be used to replace 60 UPS gasoline-powered Class 6 delivery trucks with ZE battery electric delivery trucks and install supporting charging infrastructure at three Bay Area logistics centers: 40 trucks and chargers at the Oakland facility adjacent to Oakland International Airport (OAK) in the Oakland Airport Business Park; 10 trucks and chargers at the San Francisco UPS facility, and 10 trucks and chargers at the Richmond UPS facility. On December 11, 2024, EPA announced the Port's selection and award of \$10,499,274 under the Grant.

The Project advances the Port's strategic vision of eliminating harmful emissions from Port activities and benefits some of the region's most vulnerable and underserved communities in Oakland, San Francisco, and Richmond. UPS delivery trucks currently travel through and serve disadvantaged communities, and so the replacement of older existing trucks with ZE technology will result in significant emissions and noise reductions in communities that are disproportionately impacted by air pollution. This EPA grant award is estimated to reduce annual greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 243 tons within Oakland and 61 tons of GHGs in each of the cities of Richmond and San Francisco.

Community and stakeholder engagement for the Project will build on the Port's existing deep relationships with residents and community-based organizations in East Oakland communities. Partners Black Cultural Zone Community Development Corporation (BCZ) and Lifers Leaving a Legacy (LLL) will provide support to ensure meaningful community engagement with environmental justice and disadvantaged communities. Both organizations have strong roots in Oakland and have important roles to play through the project's lifecycle and beyond. This includes educational and knowledge sharing activities, engagement and feedback collection as the Project progresses, and planning for future projects.

Under this grant, UPS will provide training to approximately 200 of their Bay Area staff operating and maintaining ZE vehicles, ensuring that the trucks will be operated efficiently and maintained to maximize useful life, while preventing displacement of the existing workforce. An early adopter of ZE technology, UPS has been able to create a sustainable workforce succession plan, ensuring that existing employees are able to remain employed during this transition.

Table 1 below summarizes grant amounts for each Project Partner and the Sub-Grant Agreement amounts. Table 1 also includes project costs for future consultants/contractors that will require a formal federal procurement process as required by EPA. Port staff will return to the Board of Port Commissioners for approval of the selected consultants/contractors.
